


Peer Power in Dorset ... what's it all about?

- support existing groups in Dorset and Devon
- establish a local community energy peer network
- inspire the setup of 8 new community energy groups
- to enable more community energy projects to happen
- increase number of projects, MW of renewable energy installed, and £s of investment raised by groups
- December 2016 -April 2018



Peer Power in Dorset – outputs

- Expert support- 81 hours (10 hours in Dorset)
- Travel bursaries £523 (£93 Dorset)
- 16 Events 674 attendees
- (5 events in Dorset 94 attendees)
- 30 newsletters
- Email and Facebook groups set up

- Ends April 2018



Roles are made up of the activities and tasks people or organisations carry out so that their network can thrive, eg:



Power and decision making


Passing on/revolving roles can help distribute power more evenly

Evaluation and impact

Nine reasons to evaluate your network:

- 1. To justify spending resources on network management by determining ROI
- 2. To identify areas for improvement or gaps and focus efforts and resources
- 3. To track progress and inform strategy and vision for the future
- 4. To apply for funding for network activities
- 5. To link business outcomes with network activities
- 6. To enable ongoing learning and opportunities for collaboration
- 7. To recognise and celebrate success and identify strengths
- 8. To assess network weaving efforts in creating network strength/sustainability
- 9. To provide an overview of network functioning, spot trends and adapt
